- Why (virtual) mobility, and why now?
- How our social realities might be described?
 - Living in times of change, epoch of liquidity, and permanent uncertainty
 - Crises, change, transformations; No peripheries (geographic, intellectual, academic)
 - CEE experiences laboratory of social life
 - No time to slow down; extreme acceleration
 - 'We are exposed to blows of fate' (Bauman)
 - From homogeneity to heterogeneity individualized encounters, competition, fragmentation
 - Contemporary life (globalization, internetization, global fashions) makes our cultures hybrid, nomadic, mixed
 - This is also our human nature people are complex

- How to deal with complexity? How to deal with uncertainties? How to manage diversity?
 - The essence is to get a sense of reality to learn to trust and understand
 - The role of HEI educating intellectuals (elite) who is able to perform and make changes
 - Showing the whole complexity of life
 - From homogeneity to heterogeneity (diversity management styles, new approaches)
 - Positive side effects using culture, literature, media and communications as means and tools of thinking of what we are and what Europe is
 - Flexibility as creativity (also as nonconformity to rules)
